U.S. ARMY SURGEON GENERAL AND COMMANDING GENERAL U.S. ARMY MEDICAL COMMAND

Lieutenant General R. Scott Dingle is the 45th Surgeon General of the U.S. Army and Commanding General, U.S. Army Medical Command. Prior to his appointment, he served as the Deputy Surgeon General and Deputy Commanding General (Support), U.S. Army Medical Command.

BG E. Darrin Cox was born in upstate New York, but considers Texas his home state. He holds a Bachelor of Science in Business Administration from Washington University, a Doctor of Medicine from Thomas Jefferson University, and a Master's Degree in Strategic Studies (Distinguished Graduate) from the U.S. Army War College.

BG Cox entered the Army under the Health Professions Scholarship Program and was commissioned a captain in the Medical Corps, following graduation from medical school. BG Cox completed his general surgery residency and thoracic surgery fellowship at Walter Reed Army Medical Center in Washington, DC. He is board certified in both general and thoracic surgery and is a Fellow of the American College of Surgeons and the American College of Chest Physicians. BG Cox holds academic appointments at the Uniformed Services University of the Health Sciences, Bethesda, Maryland, and Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center El Paso, El Paso, Texas. He is a recipient of the prestigious The Surgeon General's "A" proficiency designator for thoracic surgery.
