Modernize Civil Works Initiatives



(1) Update to the USACE Civil Works Tribal Consultation Policy

- (2) Develop Comprehensive Guidance for the Tribal Partnership Program
- (3) Potential rulemaking on the Regulatory Program's implementation procedures for Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act found at 33 CFR Appendix C.
- (4) Potential rulemaking to develop implementing procedures for the Principles, Requirements and Guidelines
- (5) Finalize an environmental justice policy, including a definition for purposes of Section 160 of the Water Resources Development Act of 2020 for the "economically disadvantaged community."



Tribal Consultation Policy – The Why Behind the Update



- On January 26, 2021, President Biden issued the Presidential Memorandum, *Tribal Consultation and Strengthening Nation-to-Nation Relationships*.
- The Memorandum called on each federal agency to engage in regular, meaningful, and robust consultation and to implement the policies directed in Executive Order 13175 of November 6, 2000, Consultation and Coordination with Indian Tribal Governments.
- In addition, President Biden issued Executive Order 13990, *Protecting Public Health and the Environment and Restoring Science to Tackle the Climate Crisis*, directing agencies to consider environmental and social justice in their mission areas.

Federal Register Notice

- Tribal Outreach in July 2022
- Collected input to develop new and updated policies

Revisions to Tribal Consultation Policy

- September December 2022
- Internal Review January – February 2023

Request for Tribal Consultation

- Dear Tribal Leaders letter sent on
 March 3, 2023
- 60-day review
- Extension requested by Northwest Indian Fisheries Commission for an additional 60-day review
- Deadline for receiving written comments or requesting G2G is July 12, 2023

Final Policy

 Target: Signing before November 2023 White House Tribal Nations Summit



Tribal Consultation Policy – Initial Tribal Feedback & Incorporation



- Overarching Comment: <u>Implementation</u> and <u>Consistency</u>
- Current Definition of "Consultation" led to the updated definition:
 - Open, timely, meaningful, collaborative and effective deliberative communication process that emphasizes trust, respect and shared responsibility;
 - To the extent practicable and permitted by law, consultation works toward mutual consensus and begins at the earliest planning stages, before decisions are made and actions are taken;
 - An active and respectful dialogue concerning actions taken by the Corps that have
 Tribal implications to tribal resources, tribal rights (including treaty rights) or
 Indian lands.





Tribal Consultation Policy – Initial Tribal Feedback & Incorporation



- "Mutual consensus" vs. United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples – "free, prior and informed consent"
- Timing, Notification, and Scope
 - Early and timely updated to include a definition of "sufficiently early"
 - Public notices are not appropriate notifications Policy includes an Appendix on protocols for Notice of Consultation (Presidential Memorandum)
 - Neither silence (nor Tribal Consultation) is consent or acceptance included in update
 - Clarity of scope of federal action





Tribal Consultation Policy – Initial Tribal Feedback & Incorporation



- Definition of "significance" and for Tribal consultation thresholds identified in policy
- Consideration of Tribal Treaty Rights & Consultation triggered for Treaty Rights interpretations
 - Updated policy to include an Appendix on Best Practices for Tribal Treaty Rights, Reserved Rights, and Other Similar Rights in Federal Actions and Federal Decision-Making
 - DoD Memorandum on Treaty Rights







 Consistent with the Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2004 and 2005, as amended, the Corps will consult with Alaska Native Corporations on the same basis as Indian Tribes under Executive Order 13175.

 USACE should consider conducting consultation even if a determination is made that a policy will not trigger consultation







 Address provisions on culturally-sensitive information consistent with DoD Instruction 4710.02, dated September 24, 2018. Army has an obligation to take into account confidentiality concerns raised by Tribes and recognizes that a Tribe may wish to keep confidential some of the culturally sensitive information it provides during consultation.







- Protocols section added to discuss handling of culturally sensitive or confidential information
 - USACE is subject to the Freedom of Information Act
 - Identify confidentiality concerns ASAP to develop a Consultation Protocol, if appropriate
 - Integrated Section 304 of NHPA and 36 CFR 800.11(c) to protect sensitive cultural resources.
 - Encourage the use of orally-provided information







- In March 2019, the Government Accountability Office (GAO) issued a Report, "Tribal Consultation: Additional Federal Actions Needed for Infrastructure Projects", which included a recommendation to document in the agency's Tribal Consultation Policy how agencies will communicate with Tribes regarding how Tribal input from consultation was considered in agency decisions on infrastructure projects.
- Proposed policy now includes a requirement to provide a written response to Tribes on how Tribal input was considered in the decision-making process for all consultations.







- USACE Regulatory Program
 - Clarified that the USACE Civil Works Tribal Consultation Policy applies to the Regulatory Program.
 - Consultation elements were expanded to include draft Approved Jurisdictional Determinations (AJDs), general permit developments, permit applications.





Other New Additions



- Use of "Nation-to-Nation"
- Inclusion of co-management and Indigenous Knowledge in Tribal Policy Principles
- Accountability section added for reporting requirements
- Added encouragement for knowledge management at command changes
- Adding Appendix A: Best Practices for Identifying and Protecting Tribal Treaty Rights, Reserved Rights, and Other Similar Rights in Federal Regulatory Actions and Federal Decision-Making
- Adding Appendix B: Notice of Consultation procedures from Presidential Memorandum on Uniform Standards for Tribal Consultation







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
