Planning Tribal Partnership Program

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WHO This Policy Covers



The US Army Corps of Engineers is strengthening Nation-to-Nation relationships through our partnerships.

Eligibility for the program includes:

- Federally recognized tribes and ANCSA Corporations
- Projects must be located primarily within Indian country (18 U.S.C. 1151), in the jurisdictional area of an Oklahoma Tribe (as determined by the Secretary of the Interior as eligible for trust land status) or in proximity to an Alaska Native Village

Development of Comprehensive Guidance

- January 2022 March 2023
- Federal Register Notice July-August 2022
- Interim guidance from ASA(CW) issued November 2022
- Water Resources Development Act of 2022 passed in December 2022
- Internal Review January February 2023

Request for Tribal Consultation

- Dear Tribal Leaders letter sent on July 25, 2023
- 60-day review
- Deadline for receiving written comments or requesting G2G is
 September 22, 2023

Final Policy

 Target: Signing before November 2023 White House Tribal Nations Summit




Tribal Partnership Program Authority



Section 203 of WRDA 2000, as amended, authorizes the Program which includes:

- Water-related planning activities study, design, and construction
- Must substantially benefit Indian Tribes
- Includes flood risk management, environmental restoration and protection, navigation, and preservation of natural and cultural resources, watershed assessments and planning activities/technical assistance
- Located:
 - Primarily within Indian Country (18 U.S.C. 1151)
 - Jurisdictional area of an Oklahoma Tribe (as determined by the Secretary of the Interior as eligible for trust land status)
 - Proximity of an Alaska Native Village





TPP Authority, Cont.



Feasibility Studies Recommending a Water resources development project

- If recommended project is greater than \$26,000,000*, study ends in a Chief's Report and requires authorization from Congress for construction phase;
- If recommended project (or per separable element) equal to or less than \$26,000,000*, design and construction can proceed under the Programmatic authority for design and construction without further Congressional approval.

Preservation of Natural and Cultural Resources

Must be related to a water resources development project

Technical Assistance or Feasibility-Like Studies

- Watershed assessments or stand-alone water-related planning activities
- Feasibility-type report without recommendations for resource planning

Other such Projects Deemed to be Appropriate by the ASA(CW)



TPP Authority, Cont.



Cost Share

- Feasibility 50% federal/50% Tribal (first \$200,000 is fully federal)
- Watershed Assessments 75% federal/25% Tribal
- Technical Assistance 100% federal

In-kind Services

100% of Tribal cost share can be fulfilled through contribution of in-kind services

Adjusted Cost Share Waiver – Section 1156 of WRDA 1986, as amended

- Waives the cost share amounts owed by a Tribe up to a certain amount
- Applies to feasibility studies and construction
- FY23 Adjusted Waiver: \$665,000
- Waiver limit includes an annual inflation adjustment (Section 135 WRDA 2020)

Ability to Pay

- Results in further reduction of cost-share amount owed by the Tribes
- Applies to all phases of TPP
- Per capita income must be less than the per capita income of 2/3 of the counties in the U.S.



Lower Brule Sioux Tribe Sewage Lagoon Protection Ecosystem Restoration Project










Tribal Partnership Program Example



Elim Harbor Subsistence Harbor, AK Preconstruction, Engineering, and Design

- Located on the shore of Norton Bay about 96 miles east of Nome, Alaska, the project aims to provide safe, reliable and efficient navigation along with access and moorage for the community of Elim.
- Currently, Elim has no moorage, harbor, or boat landing infrastructure.
- Estimated Total Project Cost of \$78M (FY 2022).
- Provided funding under the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law.





The WHY – Modernize Civil Works Initiatives



- (1) Update to the USACE Civil Works Tribal Consultation Policy
- (2) Develop Comprehensive Guidance for the Tribal Partnership Program
- (3) Potential rulemaking on the Regulatory Program's implementation procedures for Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act found at 33 CFR Appendix C
- (4) Potential rulemaking to develop implementing procedures for the Principles, Requirements and Guidelines
- (5) Finalize an environmental justice policy, including a definition for purposes of Section 160 of the Water Resources Development Act of 2020 for the "economically disadvantaged community"





The WHY – Other Policy Initiatives

- Implementation of Environmental Justice and Justice 40 Initiative, March 2022

Waiver of Cost Share Requirements



Use of EO 13175 Waiver for the Tribal Cost Share when Corps projects caused the water resources issue

Ability to Pay Calculations



There should not be a rigid formula and all Tribes should automatically be eligible

Removal of cost share match requirement



Corps should remove cost share requirement for projects that enhance tribal lands and resources

Communication on Ability to Pay and Cost Share Waiver Processes

Need increased communication and provide technical assistance to navigate adjusted waiver process

Geographic Distribution of TPP Projects



There should be equity in the distribution of TPP projects

Review of Comprehensive TPP Guidance



The draft comprehensive guidance should be submitted to tribes for multiple rounds of feedback

Projects Authorized under TPP



Corps should use maximum discretion in approving projects not specifically enumerated in the TPP authority


ASA(CW) Interim Guidance on TPP



Considerations for All TPP Projects:

- The federal objective of all TPP studies is to substantially benefit Indian tribes.
- We are making a determination on whether the projects are feasible and includes the appropriate cost sharing for the purpose the project most closely aligns.
- Feasible means: technically feasible; the economic, environmental, and social benefits to the Tribal Nation outweigh the costs; project is costeffective; and the project is environmentally acceptable.


ASA(CW) Interim Guidance on "Other such projects"



Non-Traditional Water Resources Projects

- Districts may consider and recommend TPP studies and projects that address the preservation of cultural and natural resources and such other projects determined to be appropriate based on the following criteria:
 - 1. Related to a water resource;
 - 2. Aligns with Corps capabilities and core competencies
 - 3. Project is anticipated to be under the authorized programmatic limit for TPP
- Others may be elevated to ASA(CW) for decision.

Water Resources Development Act of 2022 Changes to TPP



- Changed definition of "Indian tribe" to 25 U.S.C. 5304 from 25 U.S.C. 450b.
- Under Authorized Activities:
 - Added projects for hurricane and storm damage reduction including erosion control
 - Added technical assistance to Tribes:
 - Assistance for planning to ameliorate flood hazards, to avoid repetitive flood impacts, to anticipate, prepare, and adapt to changing hydrological and climatic conditions and extreme weather events, and to withstand, respond to, and recover rapidly from disruption due to flood hazards; and
 - The provision of, and integration into planning of, hydrologic, economic, and environmental data and analyses.






WRDA 2022 Changes to TPP, cont.



- Design and Construction per project limit (or separable element of a project) raised to \$26M from \$18.5M.
- Project Justification: The Secretary may implement a project (other than Ecosystem Restoration) if the project will –
 - ✓ significantly reduce potential flood or hurricane and storm damage hazards (which may be limited to hazards that may be addressed by measures for erosion mitigation or bank stabilization);
 - ✓ improve the quality of the environment;
 - ✓ reduce risks to life safety associated with the hazards described in subparagraph (A); and
 - ✓ improve the long-term viability of the community.





WRDA 2022 Changes to TPP, cont.



- Initial Costs up to \$200k for Feasibility Studies will be federally funded.
- Federal share of other water-related planning activities and technical assistance changed to 100% from 50%.
- Program sunset changed from 2024 to 2033.



Summary of Internal Comments & Revisions



- Application of Sections 1001 and 1002 of WRRDA 2014: 3x3 implications
 - ✓ Guidance clarifies which types of reports are subject to the reporting requirements for time and cost of feasibility studies
 - ✓ Maximum federal study costs are waived up to \$3M without further approval from ASA(CW)
- National Economic Development Plan Exceptions for Programmatic Efforts
 - ✓ NED exceptions are still required for projects requiring specific authorization from congress until agency specific procedures come out.
 - ✓ As a matter of policy, the ASA(CW) does not require a NED exception request for programmatic and non-traditional efforts.






Summary of Internal Comments & Revisions



- Work In-Kind
 - ✓ Added process for developing In-Kind MOU with Tribal partners for specifically authorized projects
 - ✓ Added flexibility for programmatic projects for alignment on a scope of work in lieu of a MOU
- Indigenous Knowledge and how to use it in TPP
 - ✓ Honest discussions up front during scoping: tools keep culturally sensitive information safe or weighing of risks of disclosing this information
 - ✓ Incorporated into General Planning Principles for Program
 - ✓ Process added for identification, where and how IK was used to drive decision-making.





Summary of Internal Comments & Revisions



- Alaska Native Corporations
 - ✓ Definition of Indian Tribe from WRDA 2022 amendment includes ANCSA Corporations
 - ✓ Specific guidance not added to this version parallel policy development
- Defining scope of Tribal Real Estate & Best Practices
 - ✓ Process added for special value considerations and conceptual acquisition plan for lands not already owned by the Tribe (primarily within Indian Country)
 - ✓ Process added for allotted land coordination with BIA and HQUSACE Real Estate
