Command History

United States Army Medical Readiness Command, East

In 1992, the U.S. Army Health Services Command restructured into Health Service Support Areas. The North Atlantic Health Service Support Area, headquartered at Walter Reed Army Medical Center, covered the northeastern U.S.

In October 1993, the U.S. Army Medical Command (Provisional) was established, integrating Army Dental and Veterinary Commands with general medical commands, and was made permanent in 1994. T

his reorganization turned the North Atlantic Health Service Support Area into the North Atlantic Regional Medical Command (NARMC), responsible for about 25% of MEDCOM's U.S. patient load.

The 2005 Base Realignment and Closure led to further changes. Walter Reed Army Medical Command was closed, merged with the Naval Medical Center at Bethesda to form Walter Reed National Military Medical Center, and the Joint Task Force Capital-Medical was established.

This prompted the Northern Regional Medical Command (NRMC) to improve healthcare delivery, covering a region from Maine to North Carolina and west to Wisconsin, overseeing a medical center, about 40 hospitals, clinics, Troop Command, and Warrior Transition Units.

On July 8, 2015, NRMC became Regional Health Command-Atlantic (RHC-A), the largest health command in Army Medicine, managing all Army medical centers, hospitals, and clinics east of the Mississippi River, including dental and public health commands.

Finally, on September 8, 2022, RHC-A was redesignated as the U.S. Army Medical Readiness Command, East, aligning with the Army's modernization efforts and the National Defense Authorization Act, focusing on Soldier and medical force readiness.
