Fact Sheet

As the nucleus of the Immediate Response Force (IRF), the 82nd Airborne Division provides a strategic hedge for combatant commanders with a responsive, agile and operationally significant force that is flexible in size and composition to accomplish missions anywhere in the world.

For that requirement, one infantry brigade combat team serves as the core of the Army's contribution to the Nation's IRF, for no-notice deployment with a second brigade combat team designated to reinforce.

The Division is leading a multinational effort to develop a robust interoperability program. The program is building trust and fostering closer relationships with our key international crisis response force partners to deliver increased mutual military capability.

The Division serves as the Joint Forcible Entry component of the IRF and is ready to deploy on short notice and lead military operations worldwide. The Division has the capability to put a greater number of boots and equipment on the ground in a crisis area more rapidly than any other element in the U.S. Military.

Our History

The 82nd Airborne Division is the only Airborne Infantry Division of the United States Army specializing in joint forcible entry operations. The 82nd Airborne Division was constituted in the National Army on August 5th, 1917, and was organized on August 25th, 1917 at Camp Gordon, Georgia. Since its initial members came from all 48 states, the unit acquired the nickname "All American," which is the basis for its famed "AA" shoulder patch.

Mission Statement: On order, the 82nd Airborne Division rapidly deploys within 18 hours of notification, conducts forcible entry parachute assaults and secures key objectives for follow-on military operations in support of U.S. National interests.

Maj. Gen. James "Pat" Work



Major General James "Pat" Work was commissioned from the United States Military Academy in 1995. He initially served as a rifle platoon leader and heavy weapons platoon leader in 3rd Battalion, 502nd Infantry Regiment, 101st Airborne Division (Air Assault), before serving as a rifle platoon leader and HHC executive officer in 3d Battalion, 75th Ranger Regiment.

Following completion of the Infantry Officers Advanced Course, MG Work commanded Company B, 1st Battalion, 23rd Infantry Regiment. He also commanded Company C, 2d Battalion, 75th Ranger Regiment. Upon completion of the Command and General Staff Officers Course, MG Work served as the operations officer and executive officer of 1st Battalion, 325th Airborne Infantry Regiment, 2nd Brigade Combat Team, 82nd Airborne Division. From 2008-2009, he served as Aide de Camp to the

20th Secretary of the Army before serving with United States Special Operations Command. In 2011, MG Work assumed command of 3rd Battalion, 187th Infantry Regiment, 101st Airborne Division (Air Assault), and in 2013 began service as a staff officer in the Operations Directorate of the Joint Staff.

In 2016, MG Work took command of 2nd Brigade Combat Team, 82nd Airborne Division. He later served as Executive Officer to the 39th Chief of Staff of the Army before an assignment as Military Deputy Director of Program Analysis and Evaluation, Deputy Chief of Staff (DCS) G8, Headquarters Department of the Army (HQDA).

In 2020, MG Work returned to the 82nd Airborne Division as the Deputy Commanding General for Support. From May 2021 until August 2023, he led the Operations, Readiness, and Mobilization Directorate within DCS G-3/5/7, HQDA.

MG Work graduated from the Marine Corps War College in 2016 and earned a Master of Public Policy Degree from Georgetown University in 2010. He is married to the former Mara Shwedo. The Works have two children.

Command Sgt. Maj. Randolph Delapena



Command Sergeant Major Randolph Delapena is a native of Miami, Florida. He graduated from Miami Coral Park Senior High in June 1996. He enlisted in the United States Army in 1996 and attended One Station Unit Training at Fort Leonard Wood, Missouri to become a Combat Engineer.

CSM Delapena has held numerous positions, which include: Combat Engineer; Team Leader; Driver to The Commanding General V Corps, Squad Leader, Drill Sergeant, Drill Sergeant of the Year, Platoon Sergeant, First Sergeant, ROTC Senior Military Instructor, the BN CSM for the 127th Airborne Engineer Battalion, 1st BCT, 82nd Airborne Division, the BCT CSM for the 2nd Brigade Combat Team, 82nd Airborne Division, Division CSM for the U.S Army Corps of Engineers Transatlantic Division, and the CSM for the Maneuver Support Center of Excellence, Fort Leonard Wood, MO.

CSM Delapena's stateside assignments include Ft. Stewart, GA, Ft. Bragg, NC, Ft. Sill, OK, University of Florida ROTC, Gainesville, FL, Ft Bliss, TX, and Ft. Leonard Wood, MO. His overseas assignments include Bamberg and Heidelberg, Germany. He has deployed in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom, Operation Enduring Freedom, and Operation Inherent Resolve.
