

Brigadier General Jin H. Pak
19 Expeditionary Sustainment Command – Commanding General



Brigadier General Jin H. Pak assumed duties as the Commanding General, 19th Expeditionary Sustainment Command, on 05 June 2024. Born in South Korea, he immigrated to the United States at the age of six and grew up in Queens, New York.

BG Pak graduated from the United States Military Academy and received his commission into the Transportation Corps in 1994. He is married to Lucie Pak, and they have two adult children, 1LT Tyler Pak and Sophia Pak.

During his multiple decades of military service BG Pak led at every echelon with the 28th Transportation Battalion (Germany); 3d Armored Cavalry Regiment and 68th Corps Support Battalion (Fort Carson); 3d Infantry Brigade Combat Team, 1st Infantry Division (Fort Cavazos); 25th Transportation Battalion, 19th Expeditionary Sustainment Command (Republic of Korea); 598th Transportation Brigade, Surface Deployment and Distribution Command (Germany); and as the 58th Commandant of the U.S. Army Quartermaster School (Fort Gregg-Adams).

Other significant assignments include Assistant Professor for International Relations and Department Executive Officer with the Department of Social Sciences at West Point; Military Assistant to the Office of the Deputy Chief of Staff, G-4 HQDA; Chief of Combined Plans, UCJ-5 Directorate Combined Forces Command, Republic of Korea; Assistant Deputy Chief of Staff, G-4, Forces Command; Commanding General's Initiative Group, Army Materiel Command; and Executive Officer to the Commanding General, Army Materiel Command.

BG Pak is a graduate of the Transportation Basic Course, Combined Logistics Captain's Career Course, Combined Arms and Services Staff School, Command and General Staff College, the Kennedy School of Government at Harvard University, and the Joint Advanced Warfighting School.

His awards and decorations include the Legion of Merit (with four oak leaf clusters), the Bronze Star Medal, the Defense Superior Service Medal, the Meritorious Service Medal (with four oak leaf clusters), the Joint Service Commendation Medal, the Army Commendation Medal (with four oak leaf clusters), the Joint Service Achievement Medal, the Army Achievement Medal, the Parachutist Badge, and the Army Staff Badge.
