

Vision



(Summary)

- Integrate principles of environmental justice and the Federal Trust responsibility into USACE work. (outward facing)
- Build and train the USACE <u>workforce</u> that is capable of implementing the work. *(inward facing)*

...so that all communities can access the benefits of Civil Works Programs, and enjoy a healthy, sustainable, and resilient environment.





Recruit, retain, and train a workforce with the ability to advance environmental justice and protect our Federal trust responsibilities.





1.1 Build a workforce that reflects the diversity of the American people and includes those with lived experience of environmental justice concerns.

1.2 Create and sustain the workforce environment where such a workforce can thrive.

1.3 Build environmental justice literacy at USACE.

1.4 Train USACE staff on how to meaningfully and respectfully engage with Tribal Nations and with communities with environmental justice concerns.



Conduct USACE work activities in ways that advance environmental justice.





2.1 <u>Focus staff time on efforts that will increase access</u> to environmental benefits in communities with environmental justice concerns, including in U.S. territories and across Tribal Nations.

2.2 <u>Improve</u> the way USACE <u>conducts outreach</u> in both Civil Works projects and permits, and <u>improve</u> the way USACE <u>integrates Tribal and public input</u> received into work activities.

2.3 Evaluate the legal tools USACE has to identifying impacts and <u>implementing alternative solutions</u> or specific <u>mitigation actions</u> that <u>would reduce burdens</u>.





Collaborate and build the partnerships needed to advance environmental justice across the nation.





3.1 <u>Build</u>, nurture, and repair <u>trusted relationships</u> with Tribal Nations and communities with environmental justice concerns.

3.2 Build <u>strategic partnerships</u> and increase collaboration with other agencies and organizations who can help advance environmental justice.

3.3 Participate in <u>interagency committees</u> and <u>working groups</u> to advance environmental justice.





Refine the policies and processes that guide how USACE works to advance environmental justice.





4.1 Review and recommend improvements to Civil Works <u>policy</u> or <u>guidance</u> that could <u>reduce</u> environmental burdens, <u>increase access</u> to environmental benefits, and <u>reduce barriers</u> to USACE decision-making.

4.2 To the maximum extent possible, <u>focus resources in</u> Tribal communities and in other places that have the most environmental burdens, that would be the most affected by an agency action, or are <u>most in need</u> of advancing environmental justice.



Goal 5: Further Institutionalize Environmental Justice



(Summary)

Institutionalize environmental justice and Federal trust principles across USACE throughout all operations and establish accountability for decisionmakers and practitioners.





5.1 Learn <u>how environmental justice</u> and Tribal trust issues <u>intersect with all work</u> USACE and update Policy and Process as referenced in Goal 4.

5.2 Provide for <u>staff accountability</u> to learn and advance environmental justice and uphold the Federal trust responsibilities.

5.3 Create a feedback mechanism to <u>update Senior</u> <u>Leaders on progress and challenges to</u> implementing environmental justice strategies.
