#### **COLONEL FREDDY L. ADAMS**

MICC Commander

Colonel Freddy L. Adams is the commander of the Mission and Installation Contracting Command at Joint Base San Antonio-Fort Sam Houston, Texas. The MICC, a subordinate command to the U.S. Army Contracting Command, is comprised of approximately 1,500 uniformed and civilian acquisition and support professionals providing Army commands, installations and activities with responsive business solutions and contracting administration. The MICC consists of two contracting support brigades, two field directorates, 9 contracting battalions and offices across 30 locations within the continental United States. Its brigades, battalions and contracting detachments are strategically aligned to deploy Soldiers in support of mission partners during contingency and humanitarian operations overseas and across the homeland.



Prior to assuming command of the MICC in June 2024, he served as the Chief of Staff and Senior Military Assistant to the Assistant Secretary of the Army for Acquisition, Logistics, and Technology (ASA (AL&T)). In this capacity, he oversaw and managed the staff operations of a principal staff within the Headquarters Department of the Army (HODA).

Colonel Adams was commissioned as a second lieutenant in May 1998 upon graduation from the United States Military Academy at West Point.

His previous assignments include: Assistant Regimental Engineer, Tank Platoon Leader, Company Executive Officer and Battalion Logistics Officer, 1st Battalion (Opposing Force), 4th Infantry Regiment at Hohenfels, Germany; Squadron Personnel Officer and Troop Commander, 3rd Squadron, 3rd Armored Cavalry Regiment, Fort Carson, Colorado; Operations Team Chief, Defense Contract Management Agency (DCMA)-Northern California; Contingency Contracting Team Leader, 902nd Contingency Contracting Battalion, Joint Base Lewis-McChord, Washington; Regional Contracting Center Deputy Chief, Forward Operating Base Fenty, Afghanistan; Chief Plans Officer, 410th Contracting Support Brigade, JBSA-Fort Sam Houston; Executive Officer to the Commanding General, MICC, JBSA-Fort Sam Houston; Commander, DCMA-Afghanistan; Commander, DCMA-Saint Petersburg, Florida; Executive Officer to the Principal Military Deputy to the ASA (AL&T)), Commander, 409th CSB, Kaiserslautern, Germany; Director of Army Contracting and Military Deputy to the Deputy Assistant Secretary of the Army for Procurement (DASA (P)), Pentagon.

Colonel Adams has a Master of Business Administration from the University of Texas at Austin. He is also a graduate of the U.S. Army Command and General Staff College and was a distinguished graduate of the National Defense University Dwight D. Eisenhower School for National Security and Resource Strategy. He is a certified acquisition professional in contracting, certified advanced level in program management and a member of the Defense Acquisition Corps.

His awards and recognitions include the Legion of Merit with one oak leaf cluster, Bronze Star Medal with two oak leaf clusters, the Purple Heart, Defense Meritorious Service Medal with one oak leaf cluster, Meritorious Service Medal with two oak leaf clusters, Army Commendation Medal with valor device and two oak leaf clusters, National Defense Service Medal with two oak leaf clusters, Afghanistan Campaign Medal, Iraq Campaign Medal, Global War on Terror Expeditionary Medal, Global War on Terror Service Medal, Army Service Ribbon, Army Overseas Service Ribbon with two awards and the NATO Service Medal. He is also authorized to wear the Combat Action Badge and Airborne Badge.



#### COMMAND SERGEANT MAJOR JASON L. GUSMAN


Outgoing MICC Command Sergeant Major

Command Sergeant Major Jason L. Gusman serves as the Command Sergeant Major of the U.S. Army Mission and Installation Contracting Command at Joint Base San Antonio-Fort Sam Houston, Texas from June 2022 to November 2024. Prior to assuming responsibility as the seventh MICC command sergeant major, he served as the command sergeant major for the U.S. Army Garrison at Fort Detrick, Maryland. He also served as the command sergeant major for the 528th Special Troops Battalion Special Operations (Airborne) at Fort Bragg from 2018 to 2020.

CSM Gusman departs the MICC to serve as the command sergeant major for the Army Sustainment Command at Rock Island, Illinois.

He enlisted in the U.S. Army in July 1994 and attended Basic Combat
Training at Fort Leonard Wood, MO, and Advanced Individual Training as a Unit Supply Specialist at
Fort Lee (redesignated as Fort Gregg-Adams in 2023), Virginia. CSM Gusman's assignments include

Kaserne, Germany; Headquarters and Headquarters Company, 1st Battalion, 160th Special

He is pursuing a bachelor's degree through Excelsior College.

The U.S. Army Mission and Installation Contracting Command is a major subordinate command of the U.S. Army Contracting Command. MICC Soldiers, civilians, and contractors support Soldiers and their families in the continental United States and Puerto Rico by delivering ready, decisive, and synchronized business solutions and contracting support to the Army enterprise.

Headquartered at Joint Base San Antonio-Fort Sam Houston, Texas, the MICC is a one-star command made up of about 1,500 Soldiers and Civilian employees assigned to two contracting support brigades, two field directorates, 9 contracting battalions and offices across 30 locations within the continental United States that provide contracting support to the Army enterprise.

The MICC delivers the power of Army contracting by acquiring equipment, supplies, and services vital to the U.S. Army mission and the well-being of Soldiers and their families. The command also supports the Army's contingency and wartime missions by rapidly deploying trained and ready contingency-contracting Soldiers around the world to procure goods and services in austere environments to win in multi-domain operations. Contracting brigades and battalions are strategically aligned to provide operational contract support to their respective corps or divisions when deployed.

MICC-contracted services and supplies touch virtually every Soldier in the Army from facilities support services, commercial and institutional building construction, and administrative and general management consulting services to wired consulting services, telecommunication, and engineering services contracted food services, advertising and transition services. The MICC ensures America's Soldiers and their families have what they need during and after military service.


ACC designated the MICC as its lead for installation readiness to provide acquisition insights and ensure Army installations are capable of supporting current and evolving readiness and power projection requirements.

MICC contracts are vital in feeding more than 200,000 Soldiers every day, providing many daily base operations support services at installations, preparing more than 100,000 conventional force members annually, facilitating training for more than 100,000 students each year, and maintaining more than 14.4 million acres of land and 170,000 structures. In fiscal year 2024, the command executed more than 22,000 contract actions valued at nearly \$5.5 billion across the Army, including \$3 billion to American small businesses. The command also manages the Army's largest and most complex Government Purchase Card Program, administering nearly 366,000 GPC transactions in fiscal year 2024 valued at an additional \$567 million.

With a wealth of contracting expertise, MICC professionals are dedicated to providing the highest quality of contracting support to all of their mission partners, whenever and wherever needed. The responsive contracting solutions and oversight provided by the command serve as a force multiplier in ensuring the Army is ready to fight and win.
