

CW5 Jamie S. Turner

Command Chief Warrant Officer, U.S. Army Counterintelligence Command



Chief Warrant Officer Five Jamie S. Turner is a U.S. Army Counterintelligence Special Agent and Technician who has served in Army Counterintelligence (CI) for over 27 years.

CW5 Turner was born in Waterville, Maine and enlisted in the U.S. Army in November 1988 as a CI Agent Assistant. He attended Basic Training (BT) at Fort Leonard Wood, MO followed by Advanced Individual Training (AIT) at Fort Huachuca, AZ. Upon completion of AIT, he was assigned to the Wonju Resident Office, 524th Military Intelligence Battalion, Yongsan, Korea as a CI Agent Assistant. His next duty assignment was at the 902nd Military Intelligence Group, Fort Meade, MD as a CI Agent. CW5 Turner completed his service and left the U.S. Army in January 1992.

CW5 Turner enlisted in the U.S. Army, again, in October 2000 as a CI Agent. He attended BT at Fort Jackson, SC followed by AIT at Fort Huachuca, AZ. Upon completion of AIT, he was assigned to the 202nd Military Intelligence

Battalion, Fort Eisenhower, GA as a CI Agent, where he deployed to Saudi Arabia in support of Operation Enduring Freedom and Kuwait and Iraq in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom (OIF). His next duty station was the 309th Military Intelligence Battalion as a CI Agent Course Instructor and Counterintelligence Force Protection Source Operations Instructor. Upon completion of this assignment, he was assigned to 1st Information Operations Command, Fort Belvoir, VA as an Information Operations Planner and Battalion Operations NCOIC where he deployed to Afghanistan with 3rd Special Forces Group in support of Operation Enduring Freedom (OEF). In April 2007, CW5 Turner attended Warrant Officer Candidate School (WOCS). Upon completion of WOCS, he attended the Warrant Officer Basic Course and reported to Headquarters, 25th Infantry Division, Schofield Barracks, HI as a CI Technician and where he deployed to Iraq in support of OIF as the Commanding General's Intelligence Officer and Multi-National Division-North Counterintelligence Coordinating Authority (CICA). His next assignment was the National Capitol Region Field Office, 902nd Military Intelligence Brigade, Fort Belvoir, VA as the Special Agent in Charge and Officer in Charge (OIC). After completing this assignment, CW5 Turner reported to the 309th Military Intelligence Battalion, Fort Huachuca, AZ as the CI Officer Course Manager and CI Special Agent Course Manager. Following his time at Fort Huachuca, he reported to Headquarters, 10th Mountain Division, as the Division CICA and G2X OIC. While at 10th Mountain Division, he deployed to Afghanistan in support of OEF, as the Task Force CICA and Division Intelligence Plans Officer and to Iraq in support of Operation Inherent Resolve as the Task Force CICA. Upon completion of his assignment to 10th Mountain Division, CW5 Turner served as the Deputy CICA for the United States Southern Command, Doral, FL. CW5 Turner's last assignment, prior to reporting to United States Army Counterintelligence Command was as the Command Security Manager for 1st Capabilities Integration Group (Airborne), Fort Belvoir, VA.

His education includes a Bachelor of Arts degree in Homeland Security and Emergency Management from Ashford University and an Associates of Applied Science degree in Intelligence Operations from Cochise College.

CW5 Turner's awards and decorations include the Bronze Star Medal (1 OLC), Defense Meritorious Service Medal (1 OLC), Meritorious Service Medal (4 OLC), Joint Service Commendation Medal, Army Commendation Medal (4 OLC), Army Achievement Medal (1 OLC), Joint Meritorious Award (2 OLC), Meritorious Unit Commendation, Good Conduct Medal (3rd Award), National Defense Service Medal (1 Bronze Star), Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal, Iraq Campaign Medal (2 Campaign Star), Inherent Resolve Campaign Medal, Global War on Terrorism Expeditionary Medal, Global War on Terrorism Service Medal, Korea Defense Service Medal, NCO Professional Development Ribbon (Numeral 2), Army Service Ribbon, Overseas Service Ribbon (Numeral 4), and the NATO Medal.
