

LESSONS LEARNED PROGRAM DEVELOPMENT SEMINAR WITH CHILEAN ARMY

In support of a U.S. Army South-Chilean Army FY24 Agreed-to-Action, our CALL Military Analyst Forward (MAF) at U.S. Army South conducted a Lessons Learned Program Development Seminar at the Chilean Army Lessons Learned Center (CELAE) in Santiago, Chile from 24-26 September 2024. The event marks the first time the U.S. and Chilean Army lessons learned centers have met in Chile. Additionally, the Combined Arms Doctrine Directorate (CADD) provided a virtual Doctrine Development Seminar on Day 2 of the engagement. Attendees included the Chilean Army Doctrine Division Chief of Staff/Lessons Learned Center Director, Doctrine

Division Commander, Chief of Doctrine and Lessons Learned Publications Department, and assigned CELAE analysts. The CALL seminar ensured access is increased between the U.S. and Chile. Results included the strengthening of partnerships, improved interoperability, and enhanced mutual readiness.

NATIONAL TRAINING CENTER



The National Training Center (NTC) continues to train rotational training units, joint, interagency, and multinational partners to build and sustain readiness to fight and win. The last quarter included a training rotation with the 2nd Armored Brigade Combat Team (Black Jack), 1st Cavalry Division (First Team). While the training environment is normally at the brigade combat team level, NTC will be conducting a division-level exercise in January with the 1st Infantry Division (The Big Red One) in 25-03, followed by a February rotation with their First Brigade (Devil Brigade) in 25-04.

NTC continues to share lessons from these rotations through their *TAC Talks* videos and *Thinking Inside the Box – The Gauntlet* podcast. New videos/podcasts are highlighted below:

 TAC Talks Episode 15: Fighting Army Aviation in LSCO is the first of three parts, focusing on aviation at a distance is discussed with topics such as a transparent battlefield, what was learned from past and current operations, sustainment observations, and command and control.

New *Thinking Inside the Box – The Gauntlet* episodes:

- Thinking Inside the Box The Gauntlet Episode 16: Fires describes how a battalion fire support officer (FSO) best prepares the fires cell to receive and execute fire missions at the National Training Center.
- Thinking Inside the Box The Gauntlet Episode 17: Movement and Maneuver describes the operations' process (plan, prepare, execute and access), speaks on what some of the common problems are during battalion to company handovers, and shares best practices in preparation from an integration perspective.

Other NTC podcasts include an episode on *The Dirt Logistician* titled NCO Roles in the Division LOGPAC discusses best practices when preparing for the division logistics package (LOGPAC) at the division support area (DSA) and receiving the division LOGPAC at the brigade support area (BSA). The NTC Special Operations Training Detachment also

produced and published several episodes on their newly created *Off the Radar* podcast, focusing on the training and preparation of the Army Special Operations Forces community.

NTC also released other products this quarter to include a variety of papers and the aviation trainers Eagle Eye Newsletter. Redefining Airspace Management

With the estimated production of over one million drones, the proliferation of small Unmanned Aerial Systems (sUAS) in the Russo-Ukrainian War drove a significant increase in the number of aircraft flying, which increased demands against low-altitude airspace usage. Heavy sUAS utilization necessitates a robust, layered, and flexible airspace management system capable of enabling both manned and unmanned aircraft. At the Joint Multinational Readiness Center (JMRC). effective airspace management is crucial to the success of rotational training exercises. The integration of rotary-wing (RW) aircraft and sUAS for both multinational training units and opposing forces in JMRC's diverse training area requires precise coordination and deconfliction to ensure effectiveness while minimizing risks. To accomplish this, JMRC coaches the Brigade to develop and manage a unit airspace plan (UAP) using a keypad map controlled by the Hohenfels Tower to deconflict manned and unmanned systems. The keypad map is critical for airspace management

with joint and multinational forces who do not share common C2 systems.

Recently, JMRC implemented the keypad map for the 173rd BDE who brought 60+ newly acquired sUAS platforms. The increase in aircraft volumes necessitated a common management system to enable permissive use of the airspace. The keypad map serves as a standardized tool for every pilot and sUAS operator. The Brigade (BDE) Air Defense Airspace Management (ADAM)/Brigade Aviation Element (BAE) manages these keypads in real time as part of their UAP. Operators establish informal Restricted Operating Zones (ROZs) at 0-500 ft, 500-5000 ft, >5000 ft above ground level (AGL) as procedural control methods before any flight. Prior to launching RW aircraft, pilots confirm that their route is clear with the ADAM/BAE and Hohenfels Tower. By deconflicting both laterally and vertically using keypads, JMRC enables simultaneous sUAS and RW operations, allowing for mass of combat power during key phases of the mission.

Additionally, JMRC permits an unlimited number of sUAS to operate within an established ROZ. JMRC also removed the 1-to-1 Observer/Coach-Trainer (OCT) to sUAS operator ratio, giving units the freedom to fly in allotted airspace. JMRC also allows RW aircraft to transit above or below established UAS ROZs, ensuring deconfliction by altitude. Implementing an airspace plan that ensures the ability to integrate sUAS in-depth without compromising RW aircraft maneuverability must become a priority for all units.




Microsoft Teams during the Army Lessons Learned Forum (ALLF) mid-cycle Council of Colonels (CoC). The FY25 topics discussed were See, Sense, Understand, and Direct; Multi-Echelon Fires; Focused Warfighting Functions; and Modernization. Assessment slides containing all FY25 collection efforts are posted in the ALLP portion of CALL's restricted website [CAC login required] and in the unclassified Joint Lessons Learned Information System (JLLIS) binder N240618-11795. The next QPA is scheduled during the ALLF mid-cycle CoC on 12 March 2025 via Microsoft Teams.

25-911, U.S. Army South Exercise: Southern Vanguard 24 (Dec 24)




Executed from the end of July through August in 2024, the exercise scenario was set in the Western Pacific and built upon a Decisive Action Training Environment (DATE)-backed scenario. XVIII Airborne Corps, located at Fort Liberty, was the primary training audience; 101st Airborne Division (Air Assault)

and 5 Special Forces Group (SFG), located at Fort Campbell, were secondary training audiences.

The corps conducted a variety of offensive operations and enabling tasks, including Joint Forcible Entry Operations (JFEO) by air and sea. U.S. Army Pacific served as the higher command (HICOM) and exercise director.

Establishing conditions for execution is critical to success; however, doctrine does not clearly define the process of how to do so. 

CALL sent a two-person collection team to Joint Pacific Multinational Readiness Center (JPMRC) Rotation 23-02, held at Fort Wainwright, AK. The purpose of the JPMRC Rotation 23-02 was to train on joint and multinational operations in the arctic and improve unit proficiencies in the key areas of readiness to



deploy, fight, and win large-scale combat operations (LSCO) in frigid environments. This rotation allowed for the possibility of informing the U.S. Army on arctic doctrine and strategy through gaps, lessons learned, and best practices from JPMRC rotations in Alaska across the DOTMLPF-P spectrum.
