After several few weeks of high temperatures, Aug. 11 marks the last day of the dog days of summer, known as "mal bok," in Korea. We look forward to declining temperatures, especially as we gear up for the 2017 Ulchi Focus Guardian Exercise Aug. 21-Sept. 1. You will notice an influx of troops arriving at our garrison, so please be patient as some of our services, facilities and roads may be impacted by exercise preparation efforts. In particular, all service members must be aware that General Order Number 1 starts Aug. 20, prohibiting alcohol consumption for the duration of the exercise.

Driving on the installation may also be affected with the influx of personnel, so please exercise caution and note driving privileges will be suspended for violations (pages 5-11) per Command Policy #108. In particular, under the provisions of USFK Regulation 190-1, a DUI will result in automatic revocation of military and POV driving privileges.

August is anti-terrorism awareness month, but every day should be focused on operations security. Please see the enclosed OPSEC smart sheet for an important list of DOs and DON'Ts on how you can help protect our community from hackers and terrorists (page 12).

With summer comes mosquitos, which pose the risk of malaria to our community (page 13). Please see the attached on how to protect yourself from contracting this dangerous infectious disease.

With the new school year start date just around the corner (Aug. 28), it is time to revisit some basic safety rules with regard to dropping off children, school bus traffic and crosswalks (pages 14-15). Please make eye contact with pedestrians at all crosswalks, and always be alert when sharing the road with bicyclists. The schools would also like to remind you to pick up bus passes for your children (page 16).

You may have noticed changes taking place throughout the garrison with transformation and unit moves to USAG Humphreys. We have included notes on our base closure progress (page 18) to keep our community informed.

SUBJECT: Command Policy #108, Suspension of Driving Privileges

1. References:

- a. AR 190-5, Motor Vehicle Safety Traffic Supervision, 22 May 2006.
- b. USFK Regulation 190-1, Motor Vehicle Traffic Supervision, 10 May 2012.
- 2. The proponent for this policy is the Directorate of Emergency Services (DES).
- 3. This policy is effective immediately. It remains in effect until rescinded or superseded.
- 4. Applicability: This policy applies to personnel authorized to operate motor vehicles on USAG-Humphreys.
- 5. Purpose: This policy sets responsibilities and procedures for suspension of driving privileges on USAG-Yongsan.
- 6. General: This policy is punitive in nature and violation(s) of the provisions herein may subject military personnel to disciplinary and/or administrative actions. Family members, civilians, contractors, and visitors who do not comply with this policy may be subject to administrative actions or sanctions. The Garrison Commander of USAG- Humphreys withholds driving privilege suspension and revocation authority. This authority, however, may be further delegated down to the Deputy to the Garrison Commander (DGC) AW USFK Reg190-1.
- 7. Suspensions: Driving privileges may be suspended whenever an individual consistently violates installation traffic regulations, as determined by the revocation authority. Suspensions will apply to individuals when other measures such as counseling, remedial driver training, and rehabilitation programs fail to improve driver performance. Suspension may also be used as a temporary measure pending resolution of a revocation hearing. Suspensions, other than as a temporary measure pending the resolution of a revocation hearing, will not exceed a period of 180 days.

SUBJECT: Command Policy #108, Suspension of Driving Privileges

Suspensions will terminate at the end of the specified period and the driving privileges will automatically be reinstated. Suspensions will be discretionary or mandatory and for periods specified in subparagraphs 7a and 7b below. The period of suspension will begin on the date the U.S. Forces certificate of license is confiscated. Suspending authorities may suspend an individual's U.S. Forces certificate of license for a period of up to, but no longer than 180 days when appropriate. Offenses involving alcohol or controlled substances will require the license holder to attend and successfully complete an Army Substance Abuse Program (ASAP) or Army Drug and Alcohol Program Training (ADAPT) Program and remedial driver training.

- **a.** Discretionary Suspension. Discretionary suspensions may be assessed for periods not to exceed 180 days. The suspending authority may suspend a licensee's driving privilege for the following:
- (1) Evaluate a licensee's physical or mental disability after a physician has submitted a statement that the person is incapable of safely operating a POV. A U.S. Forces certificate of license will be returned only when a physician provides a statement that the person has recovered.
- (2) Assess a licensee's driving skill. When the suspending authority determines that the person lacks the necessary driving skill or knowledge, the authority may suspend a U.S. Forces certificate of license until the licensee has retaken and passed tests required by this publication. If a person fails to pass the tests for a Government driver's license (OF 346), his or her U.S. Forces certificate of license may be suspended. (This suspension only applies to military personnel.)
- (3) Investigate incidents involving the licensee. The driving privileges of involved persons may be suspended until the investigation is completed and final action is taken. In alcohol-related incidents, the commander or supervisor must immediately suspend the licensee's U.S. Forces certificate of license pending resolution.
- (4) Review the licensee's failure to remove or cover indecent or obscene matter on a POV or to move the POV displaying indecent or obscene matter from the installation after being asked to do so.
 - (5) Owning or operating an unregistered or uninsured POV.
 - (6) Displaying a lack of good judgment about safe and prudent operation of a POV
- (7) Misconduct that indicates the licensee's poor qualifications as a driver. Examples are:

- (a) Abuse of alcohol or controlled substances.
- (b) Habitual acts of violence.
- (c) Numerous (three or more) nonmoving violations.
- (d) Allowing someone to operate a POV without a U.S. Forces certificate of license or without a U.S. Forces certificate of license valid for the vehicle class operated.
- (8) Transferring license plates to another POV without properly registering the plates to the POV.
- (9) Committing a traffic offense outside Korea that would require suspension or revocation under this publication if committed in Korea.
- (10) Using or allowing someone else to use a U.S. Forces certificate of license in an unlawful or fraudulent manner.
- (11) Fleeing or attempting to flee a police officer after committing a traffic violation.
- b. **Mandatory Suspension**. The revocation authority will immediately suspend the driving privileges of an individual who commits a serious driving offense (defined as an offense assessed more than 3 points under AR 190-5/0PNAV 11200.50/AFI 31- 218(1)/MCO 5110.1D/DLAR 5720.1 while awaiting adjudication or administrative due process for commission of another driving offense and the gravity of the alleged offenses, together with the individual's previous record, causes serious concern for the safety of others. The revocation authority will also suspend driving privileges for offenses that are assessed as 3 points or less under AR 190-5/0PNAV 11200.50/AFI 31-218(1)/MCO 5110.1D/DLAR 5720.1. Mandatory suspensions will be assessed for 7 days, 30 days, 90 days, or 180 days as indicated below.

(1) 7 days for:

- (a) Failure of operator or occupants to use available restraint system devices while moving.
- (b) Failure to wear an approved helmet and/or protective equipment while operating or riding on a motorcycle or moped.

- (c) Wearing/using headphones while driving and/or use of a non-hands-free Mobile Phone Electronic Device (MPED) while driving.
 - (d) Failure to stop vehicle during reveille or retreat.

(2) 30 days for:

- (a) A second offense of (1) above or two or more of the above offenses committed within a 180 day period.
- (b) Failure to stop for school bus or school crossing signals or government buses while loading and unloading.
 - (c) Failure to yield right of way to emergency vehicles.
 - (d) Failure to obey traffic instructions of an enforcement officer or traffic warden.
 - (e) Speeding 10 miles per hour above the posted speed limit.

(3) 90 days for:

- (a) Owning or operating an unregistered or uninsured POV (two or more offenses).
 - (b) Speeding 20 miles per hour above the posted speed limit.
- (c) Reckless driving (willful and wanton disregard for safety of persons or property).

(4) 180 days for:

- (a) Having two convictions or having received two non-judicial punishments for reckless driving in a 1-year period.
- (b) Accumulating 12 or more traffic points in a 1-year period or 18 traffic points in a 2-year period. The offender must complete remedial driver training before his or her U.S. Forces certificate of license may be returned.

- (c) Failure of operator or occupants to use available restraint system devices while moving (third and subsequent offenses)
- 8. Revocations: The revocation of driving privileges is a severe administrative measure to be imposed for serious moving violations or when other available corrective actions fail to produce the desired improvement. Revocation of driving privileges will be imposed for a specific period of time, but never less than 180 days. Mandatory and discretionary revocations will be conducted IAW USFK Reg190-1.

4. Upon termination of the suspension period, your driving privileges will automatically be reinstated. You are required to report to the USAG Yongsan Provost Marshal office at which time your USFK Motor Vehicle Operator's Permit will be returned to you.
5. You are warned that the revocation of your driving privileges for no less than Six (6) months will be imposed if you are found driving a vehicle either on or off-post while your driving privileges are suspended or revoked.

OPSEC (Operations Security) Smart Sheet



OPSEC is the systematic process of knowing what information you have needs protection, from whom and how to protect it. The enemy needs the information that IMCOM manages and part of our job is to ensure that the mission and people are safe by denying the enemy's access.

The items below are things you need to know:

- * "Who is the threat?"
- Generalized- Phishing, hackers, competitors; Local- criminals, insider, anti-government
- * "How are they trying to obtain my information?"
- Observation, listening, solicitation, theft, email phishing
- * USAG Yongsan Security Manager

<u>"DO's</u>

Study the Critical Information List (CIL), know what you have- maintain the CIL close by

- * Always encrypt PII
- * Shred or use gray bins for disposal of PII, FOUO information
- * Remember, it's OPERATIONS Security, not Operational Security
- Wear your IMCOM badge inside of the bldg.

DON'T's

- * Leave CAC cards unattended in your computer
- * Leave PII, FOUO or sensitive information unsecured at your desk or at the printer
- * Talk about work at Subway, latrines or in common areas
- * Leave visitors unattended, report suspicious personnel to your supervisor
- * Display your IMCOM badge outside of the bldg
- * OPSEC is a 5 Step Process- Identify Critical Information, Analyze Threat, Analyze Vulnerability, Assess Risk, Apply Countermeasures

Malaria Awareness & Prevention



- **Vivax Malaria** is a serious; but rarely fatal infectious disease. The National Center for Medical Intelligence (NCMI) assess the risk of malaria in South Korea as "INTERMEDIATE."
- What is Malaria? Malaria is an infectious disease that's transmitted to humans by the bite of an infected Anopheles mosquitos which commonly bite during dusk and dawn. The peak season is typically from 1 May to 1 November.
- What are the symptoms? For approximately 30% of individuals Malaria symptoms appear within in 7-21 days. In 70%, symptoms are delayed and appear between 6-18 months after being bitten.

Four symptoms are <u>always</u> present:

Sudden onset of <u>Chills</u>, followed by <u>Fever</u>, then often <u>Intense sweats</u> that last 2-6 hrs, followed by <u>Malaise</u> (fatigue)

Other common symptoms may include:

- Vomiting
- Diarrhea
- Headache
- Nausea

How can I reduce my risk?

- Ensure proper wear of Permethrin treated Army Combat Uniforms (ACUs) or Operation Camouflage Pattern (OCP) Uniforms while in field environments (sleeves rolled down, pants tucked into boots, undershirts tucked into pants and loosely fitting).
- Apply an Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) insect repellent (DEET, Picaridin, Bayrepel, IR 3535) on exposed skin.
- Use Permethrin treated bed nets (check for holes in netting and keep loose edges off of the ground by tucking them under the sleeping bag).
 - Ensure that all Soldiers training near the DMZ receive a Medical Health Threat Brief, prior to training that includes malaria risks, preventive measures, and signs and symptoms of disease.
 - Unless conducting PRT, DO NOT wear PRT uniforms outdoors when mosquitoes are biting.

New School Year Safety Message

Team, as we begin a new month, I want to remind you that our children are about to begin a new school year this month. School days bring congestion: School buses are picking up students, kids on bikes are hurrying to get to school before the bell rings, and parents are trying to drop their kids off before work.

It's never more important for drivers to **SLOW DOWN** and **PAY ATTENTION** than when kids are present – especially before and after school.

Here are a few reminders from the National Safety Council and our Garrison Safety Professionals:

§ If You're Dropping Off

Schools often have very specific drop-off procedures for the school year. Make sure you know them for the safety of all kids. More children are hit by cars near schools than at any other location, according to the National Safe Routes to School program. The following apply to all school zones:

- •Don't double park; it blocks visibility for other children and vehicles
- •Don't load or unload children across the street from the school
- •Carpool to reduce the number of vehicles at the school

§ Sharing the Road with Young Pedestrians

According to research by the National Safety Council, most of the children who lose their lives in bus-related incidents are 4 to 7 years old, and they're walking. They are hit by the bus, or by a motorist illegally passing a stopped bus. A few precautions go a long way toward keeping children safe:

- •Don't block the crosswalk when stopped at a red light or waiting to make a turn, forcing pedestrians to go around you; this could put them in the path of moving traffic
- •In a school zone when flashers are blinking, stop and yield to pedestrians crossing the crosswalk or intersection
 - •Always stop for a school patrol officer or crossing guard holding up a stop sign
- •Take extra care to look out for children in school zones, near playgrounds and parks, and in all residential areas
 - •Don't honk or rev your engine to scare a pedestrian, even if you have the right of way
 - •Never pass a vehicle stopped for pedestrians
- •Always use extreme caution to avoid striking pedestrians wherever they may be, no matter who has the right of way

§ Sharing the Road with School Buses

If you're driving behind a bus, allow a greater following distance than if you were driving behind a car. It will give you more time to stop once the lights start flashing. It is illegal in all 50 states and here at USAG Yongsan to pass a school bus that is stopped to load or unload children.

- •Never pass a bus from behind or from either direction if you're on an undivided road if it is stopped to load or unload children
 - •If lights are flashing and the stop arm is extended, traffic must stop
- •The area 10 feet around a school bus is the most dangerous for children; stop far enough back to allow them space to safely enter and exit the bus
 - •Be alert; children often are unpredictable, and they tend to ignore hazards and take risks


§ Sharing the Road with Bicyclists

On most roads, bicyclists have the same rights and responsibilities as vehicles, but bikes can be hard to see. Children riding bikes create special problems for drivers because usually they are not able to properly determine traffic conditions. The most common cause of collision is a driver turning left in front of a bicyclist.

- •When passing a bicyclist, proceed in the same direction slowly, and leave 3 feet between your car and the cyclist
 - •When turning left and a bicyclist is approaching in the opposite direction, wait for the rider to pass
- •If you're turning right and a bicyclists is approaching from behind on the right, let the rider go through the intersection first, and always use your turn signals
- •Watch for bike riders turning in front of you without looking or signaling; children especially have a tendency to do this
 - •Be extra vigilant in school zones and residential neighborhoods
 - •Watch for bikes coming from driveways or behind parked cars
 - •Check side mirrors before opening your door

By exercising a little extra care and caution, drivers and pedestrians can co-exist safely in school zones.


USAG Yongsan Transformation & Base Closure Notes

The purpose of this message is to provide you with some information on the events surrounding the vacating of North Camp Coiner, known as the New Embassy Compound (NEC) site. As most of you already know, the Department of State (DoS) will build their new embassy on the northern portion of Camp Coiner. Please refer to the attached map of the site for reference. The NEC site is contained within the solid black line circling the northernmost part of Camp Coiner from buildings 1001 in the northwest to 1059 in the northeast, 1059 to Gate 19 in the southeast, Gate 19 to the western perimeter wall south of Gate 18, and again back up to building 1001. We are in the process of vacating the portion of Camp Coiner where the NEC will be located. Plan is to have this footprint vacated by December of this year barring any delays in construction at USAG Humphreys.

The embassy is going to construct a temporary construction fence to separate the NEC from the rest of Garrison Yongsan sometime this winter. The dashed red line on the map shows the approximate location of the temporary construction fence that will separate the construction site from the remainder of Camp Coiner. The construction fence will have two gates; one on the western side, located approximately at the building 1094 (AAFES) parking lot. The fence on the eastern side will run across the road near the intersection of Beard and Bates Streets, near building 1164. As the fence is constructed, the Garrison will have to close the visitor's center in building 1050 to allow completion of the fence as it is built near Gate 19. The fence will cut off access to the visitor's center and parking lot. The Garrison will announce this closing in advance through various communications channels and social media outlets. Once the construction fence is in place, on a date mutually agreed upon by the Garrison and the Department of State, the garrison will close Gate 19 and open Gate 20 at the top of Coiner Hill near building 1408. Gate 20 will have both pedestrian and vehicle access. The Garrison will also close pedestrian Gate 18 in advance of turning the NEC area into a construction site. When the DoS takes control of the NEC site, USAG Yongsan will close off the construction fence access gates to isolate the area from the rest of the post. Until then, the gates will be open with unrestricted access.

Units residing outside the NEC site, will not move until their schedule move date to USAG-Humphreys. All units within the NEC site that are vacating before the end of the year have scheduled move dates to USAG Humphreys before the end of the year or have been assigned swing space on Yongsan main post.


Repaving of the Eighth Army Road




